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On our way back, we stopped in Bernalillo at Coronado Monument to see the only preserved Anasazi kachina paintings in existence. Think it was Tuesday again? Hah! Wednesday, baby. We went through the displays and down into the Kiva. The only Kiva wall paintings of this type ever discovered! Painted 1000 years ago! Amazing artistry and Anasazi symbolism! Want to see them? Hah! "No Photos Allowed."

So, as we sit in the Cow Palace Best Western, in Lamar Colorado, a town apparently named after a doughnut, but smelling more like a feedlot, and forced to use dial-up Internet, our thoughts turn to a key component of our trip: The Roadside Lunch. Not always able to find calamari when we want it, we have perfected the prepare-and-eat-anywhere-anytime-roadside lunch:
